Our Lay Director, Revd Jonathan Couper, writes.

Dear All,

At the time of writing, as lockdown continues for us all, the old song "When the road is rough and steep fix your eyes upon Jesus" comes to mind.

Fixing our eyes on Jesus (Hebrews 12:2) involves lifting our hearts up to the future. Our eyesight can easily drop away from Jesus when we focus on the present without the future. Without the future the present can easily become meaningless.

For the Christian the future is bigger than getting a vaccination or "returning back to normal" (whatever that is!). We have a special future when we shall meet Him face to face in a place prepared for us. Each mansion in heaven will be unique – just as you are unique. Each one is prepared for us by Jesus Himself (John 14:1). The



home in heaven that He is getting ready for us will reflect our deep held hopes -some only God knows we have - and yet it will be marvellously much more than we could ever have imagined whilst on this earth. The transformation will be actual, the context breath taking, and our lives eternal.

But fixing our eyes on Jesus is not only about heaven when we die. The road to heaven starts on earth and involves a hope of Jesus with us and a determination to follow Him - something which the Queen demonstrates and made reference to in her Christmas broadcast a few weeks ago. Also, in other parts of the world, amidst the breakdown of society and civil war, or amidst famine, natural disaster or persecution, great resolve is being shown by millions of our Christian brothers and sisters around the world. We Christians in the UK have indeed at this time a path of dark days to tread and we too must keep our eyes fixed on Jesus. He has a path ahead for each of us.

In the valley of the shadow of death where we walk, God's light can seem not too dissimilar to other lights and darkness can seem to be so strong. But we share with the rest of the global church the knowledge that there is no other real God than the Creator and our redeemer. He is the true light who has come into the world (John 1:9) and He continues with us (Psalm 23:4). As Job in his trials refused to back down from his walk with God, neither do we.

Paul also fixed his eyes on Jesus in difficulties. He pressed onto the end refusing to wallow in the past. He wrote, "Forgetting what lies behind. I press on towards the goal" (Philippians 3:13,14). We may remember times when we "wallowed" in our past sin or past hurts, and know this did us no good. We can also choose to wallow in the "good old days" or in our past achievements. This is not the way. Like Peter on the waves in the storm, let us just keep our eyes fixed on Him. Jesus is the beginning and the End. What he has started in your heart when faith came to you, He will finish. He will stay with you.

May God bless you in your roots of faith, in your homes and in your prayers, Jonathan

2020 was a very difficult year for everyone. This time last year it was business as usual for us all. Then came lockdown, and it was as if the pause button had been pressed on our lives. 

Three members were either unable, or did not wish to meet by Zoom, but the rest of us gave it a try. We have now had four Zoom Reunions, and we will continue with them as long as lockdown prevents us from getting together in person. The nervousness about the technology is slowly disappearing, and the benefits are amazing – we feel part of Cursillo again! We are able to share the amazing things God has done in our lives, even in these dark times. We feel strengthened by the experience.

And as always, God steps in! We heard, via the Zoom Ultreya organised by Trevor, of one Cursillista who was unable to take part in Reunions because their Group were unable to meet together and did not want to Zoom. This Cursillista has now joined our Virtual Reunion Group.

Our closing message is that we can meet in our Groups virtually, and there is an opportunity to reach out to other Cursillistas who would be willing to meet virtually, but who are unable to do so at present. The Zoom Ultreya and Zoom Reunion are now with us — and who knows, in the future we may be able to combine physical and virtual meetings to enable those who are unable to travel to meetings to share our experiences live.

We also learnt how to run a Group Reunion this way and have a method now that seems to work. We had a lovely Christmas meeting with Santa hats, a glass in hand and party poppers!

When restrictions eased we made the most of the garden and had some great, distanced meetings – all the better because we could share the cake! When the rule of six came in we even met in the house, again well spaced out with windows open. However, in subsequent lockdowns we've resorted to Zoom again, having weekly meetings this time as this lockdown seems so much harder!

One of the great advantages of Zoom is that we have been able to draw in a couple from further away who had no Group Reunion before. The downside is that we have not been able to include those without the technology and have still tried to keep in touch by text etc. And we are all rather proud of our newly acquired technical skills!

Acts chapter 4 verse 35:

"They laid it at the apostles feet and it was distributed to each as any had need."

Verse 34 puts it in context:

"There was not a needy person among them for as many owned lands or houses sold them and brought the proceeds of what was sold."

Acts 435 is an online giving charity, directly connecting those who want to give with those who are in genuine need of their help, through a network of local churches and charities. It provides specific practical help, in small but significant ways, to people known to local churches and other local organisations who are in need. 100% of what is donated to Acts 435 goes directly to those in need. Nothing is removed to cover administration – if you give £80 for a cooker, that full £80 will go to purchase the item.

It is a brilliant tool in the toolbox for helping people in need in our local community. Hope is being restored to people through a simple act and at times a life changing situation.

A new advocate met a young woman who really wanted to cook healthy food for her two children. She was struggling with her gas bill and really needed a slow cooker. Within hours of putting the request on the Acts 435 website, the £35 was given. The young mother just cried when she found out. She couldn't believe that someone who didn't know her or her children could be so generous.

Support that makes an impact.

Kate suffered serious burns following an accident in her home and had been in hospital for some time. It was difficult for Derek to afford the daily bus fare to visit his wife but £60 was raised to fund a weeks bus pass. This lifted such a burden. The couple witnessed the practical love of the church in action which has impacted them both deeply.


Smiles all round.





I wonder what stories she would share?


Might she recall the day, two men walked on her waters? Or when her violent swell was stilled by the sea Lord's firm command?
